Lessons in West Coast Swing (WCS), with visiting artists Javier and Erica from Los Angeles, Salsa with Subo Batchatero, and Sociable Swing were held in the three halls to start the evening, along with a waltz session in Sodal Hall. At 8:30 things started to hop with three DJs playing salsa, batchata, and WCS.

Meanwhile, in the Ballroom, the 10-piece <u>Hot Tomatoes Dance Orchestra</u> struck it up. They were joined in each of their sets by the <u>Reveille 3 trio</u> belting out numbers made famous by the Andrews Sisters when they

toured with the Glenn Miller Orchestra. By 9 PM the building was alive with energy, while our parking escorts helped people park safely on that dark and frigid night.

Dance performances were given during the band intermissions, starting off with Watch Your Step Vintage Vignettes, a batchata ensemble, a solo salsa, and topped off by an awesome show by Javier and Erica.

The most common remarks heard that evening were that people loved flowing from one hall to another to sample the different dance forms, and that they never imagined that so many people would be there!

About 60 volunteers joined in to make this project feasible.

This event was a collaboration between American Vernacular Dance, <u>Snowhawk</u> Productions, and Halina Palmer of Loco Tango,



with cooperation by the **Boulder Tango Studio** and funding assistance from the Alex Wilson Legacy Fund.

It wasn't over until it was all over, so we came back in and moved dance floors and finished cleaning up the next morning so that BIFD could host their annual New Years Day party. All in all, it was amazing!
