Spelemannslag Fundraising Dance and Assistance with Costumes and Camp

On February 23, 2013, the Boulder Spelemannslag presented a special fundraising event at the Pearl Street Studio to raise funds for the group.

The day included a dance workshop with Roo Lester, a family dance with live music by the Spelemannslag, a dance party with current and

returning Spelemannslag members, and a silent auction.

The Boulder Spelemannslag is an ensemble of young musicians who play music for Scandinavian dancing, under the direction of Sharon Gillespie. The group has been in existence for more than 30 years and has performed in Lindsborg, Kansas, as well as several venues in Colorado.

Children can join the group around 4th or 5th grade and "graduate" at the end of high school, but remain members for life, many of them gathering annually to play together after graduation.

The group rehearses weekly, learning the tunes by year. As of February 2013 there were 17 members playing numerous instruments—guitar, violin, accordion, bass, nyckelharpa (keyed fiddle, a Swedish folk

instrument), and Hardingfele (an 8-string Norwegian fiddle).

The February 13, 2013, event was a big success, filling the Pearl Street Studio to capacity (50+ people) both for the afternoon workshop and the evening dance. Generous donations from the event paid for three Norwegian costumes (see next page) and helped two members of the group attend the weeklong Scandia Music and Dance Camp at Mendocino.

Some comments:

- "These kids are so good, I like to dance to their music."
- "We should have dance parties like this more often!"

The Spelemannslag used donations from the event to make four Norwegian costumes or "bunads," two of which are shown here.

- The yellow and blue fabric came from Trondheim, Norway, where
 it had been purchased 40 years ago by former Boulder folk
 dancers Felix and Holly, who now live in Ridgway, Colorado. They
 donated the fabric to the Spelemannslag.
- The red and blue fabric had been purchased by Maggie Butler in Norway; she donated it to the Spelemannslag.
- A third set of fabric was purchased by Jofrid Sodal in Norway and was donated to the group.

Donated funds were used to purchase vest and blouse fabric as well as fabric for the fourth bunad, and to pay a seamstress in Boulder to make the costumes.

Donations were also used to assist the two senior girls shown at right in getting scholarships to the 2013 Mendocino Scandia Camp.
