"Mark Twain's America"

Boulder Storyteller Susan Marie Frontczak and visiting pianist Jacqueline Schwab presented "Mark Twain's America," a concert of Story in Music and Music in Story, at the Avalon on Sunday, October 16, 2016, at 2:00 p.m.

The concert included a panoply of traditional American tunes—Civil War and Stephen Foster parlor songs, Victorian dance tunes, Scots and Irish immigrant dance tunes and airs, African-American spirituals, and ragtime—interspersed with both folktales and literary gold nuggets from Mark Twain's humor to Robert Service's "Shooting of Dan McGrew," which features the piano as a central character.

"The audience was warm, welcoming and attentive," Frontczak wrote in her post-event report. "We would



gladly have had more people. Paying attendance: Estimated 44 adults, 4 children; 8 volunteers; Total attendance 56. From the point of view of having 90 people at The Barn [a venue in Longmont run by Dorothy and Frank Vernon] last year, this number is a disappointment. But the response by the audience was most encouraging. After the show we got comments such as, 'You have created a whole new art form,' and 'What you do together is absolute magic. It is something new.'

"This concert represents an important milestone in our joint artistic development," Frontczak continued. "Jacqueline and I are deeply grateful for the support of the Alex 'Tink' Wilson Legacy Fund. You made it possible for us to explore new artistic territory in blending our repertoires, to offer the audience a truly unique way to enjoy our shared and diverse folk heritage.
